

GLENN O. AND EVELYN F. EMICK MASONIC YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION

The Glenn O. and Evelyn F. Emick Masonic Scholarship annually provides one \$1,000 scholarship for each of the three State Colleges – Chadron, Peru and Wayne; and one for the University of Nebraska at Kearney. The recipient must show a respectable scholastic record, be a Nebraska resident and active in one of the Masonic youth organizations – DeMolay, Job's Daughters or Rainbow Girls. Applicants for this scholarship must plan to attend one of the applicable postsecondary institutions beginning the fall of the current year.

The following information must be provided to the Grand Lodge in packet form:

1. High School Transcript with ACT Scores. If applicant is currently attending college, also include a College Transcript.
2. A copy of your letter of acceptance from Chadron State College, Peru State College, the University of Nebraska-Kearney or Wayne State College.
3. A letter of recommendation from your Masonic Youth Group Chapter Advisor which addresses such issues as leadership, character, etc.
4. A letter of recommendation from a high school or college teacher or official.
5. A letter from the applicant which discusses the following:
 - a. Career goals; and
 - b. Why being a member of a Masonic youth organization has been important to you and how it has impacted your life.
6. A wallet-sized photo

Recipients will be recognized with a certificate of award at their respective Nebraska Masonic Group Annual Meeting.

The actual dollar award will be sent directly to the Financial Aid Office of the appropriate college/university.

Glenn O. and Evelyn F. Emick Masonic Youth Scholarship

As you have indicated an interest in a Glenn O. and Evelyn F. Emick Masonic youth scholarship, the following information is provided to inform you of the history of those persons providing the scholarship.

After a country school education and several years of working on his father's farm in Ohio, Glenn came to Buffalo Gap, South Dakota, to work on a ranch. After some time on the ranch and several years working on farms in the Scottsbluff area, he decided to go on to school.

The president of the three-year-old college in Chadron made arrangements for him to take courses in the training school and to work around the college for his board and room. He was 23 at the time, and the year was 1914.

Glenn had completed prep school and was in college when he took time out to serve in the army during World War I. Following the war, he finished college, graduating with the class of 1920 from what is now Chadron State College.

From Chadron, he went to Wyoming for a year, where he earned a degree in political science. After teaching school for several years, he entered the University of Michigan and graduated in 1924 with a master's degree in education. He returned to Chadron as an instructor for one year.

He then went to the Chicago area where he taught school and attended the University of Chicago part time. He graduated from the University of Chicago with a master's in business in 1931. He went from there to the Indiana University graduating with a doctorate degree in education in 1935.

After finishing at Indiana, he was an educational advisor in the Civilian Conservation Corps program until 1942 when he entered the Air Force during World War II. He retired from the Air Force with the rank of colonel and re-entered government service as a civilian dean of the Air Force University at Wright Field.

While stationed at Mobile, Alabama, Glenn met Evelyn Bennett who was a foreign language instructor for the Air Force. They were married in New Orleans in 1942. Mrs. Emick passed away in 1969 and Dr. Emick in 1985.

Chadron State College awarded Dr. Emick its Distinguished Service Award in 1969. Other awards include a 50-year membership certificate from Phi Delta Kappa, Air Force Certificate of Meritorious Service, Air Force Commendation Medal, and the Air Force Decoration for Exceptional Service.
